2018 Legislative Session Begins



The 2018 legislative session began on Monday, January 8th. As the second year in a legislative biennium, or two-year cycle, all bills that remained under consideration when we adjourned the 2017 session may be considered in the 2018 session. The Kansas Health Institute (KHI) recently released a [2018 Kansas Legislative Preview](#) detailing health issues we may see before the legislature this year.

With the new year started and holiday snacking is over, why not create a simple new year's resolution: healthy teeth!

Medicaid is an issue we saw arise in the 2017 legislative session and will likely be pursued in 2018. HB2044, which expanded Medicaid, passed both the House and Senate, but was vetoed by Governor Brownback in March 2017. Unfortunately, the House failed to override the veto and the bill died. If the state expanded Medicaid, KHI estimated that approximately 152,000 Kansans would be newly enrolled in KanCare.

KanCare - KanCare2.0 will be an issue we see a lot of discussion around this year. The State began the process of renewing the Medicaid (KanCare) system when the request for proposal for managed care companies to bid was released in November 2017. The bids have been submitted and the state will select vendors by June and awards announced by July 1. The winning vendors will provide services in a five-year contract beginning January 1, 2019. Many advocates, as well as legislators, are concerned that the state should be trying to fix our current KanCare system and delay KanCare2.0 before we go through the renewal process.

Telehealth - In October 2017, a Joint Health Committee on Telemedicine met and after two days of hearings announced they would introduce new legislation for the 2018 session that will require insurance companies to reimburse the same amount for in-person and telehealth services. Telehealth could be a great opportunity to ensure underserved communities receive the medical and dental services they need.
