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Getting dental care can be a challenge for people with disabilities

A [story](#) in the National Public Radio (NPR) speaks about the struggles to help people with disabilities to have a pleasant dental visit as well as the struggle in finding dentists who will take medical assistance.

Hygienist Karen Eslinger, tries different ways to make patients feel comfortable, including warming up blankets and explaining step by step what her next "move" will be.

John Morgan, a professor in the division



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
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of special care at Tufts University School of Dental Medicine, and lead author of a [2012 study](#) published in the Journal of the American Dental Association that shows that people with disabilities have worse oral health than the general population. The study showed the importance of maximizing the role of the dental professional, patient and caregiver to maintain adequate oral care.

The [Marshfield Clinic](#) in Wisconsin, take people with Medicaid and people without any insurance. They specialize in caring for people with disabilities who need extra help to get through a checkup and cleaning. Not all clinics are the same because its costly and Medicaid doesn't cover all the costs. Sometimes it takes more than one person to provide services to the individuals.
