National Health Survey early release

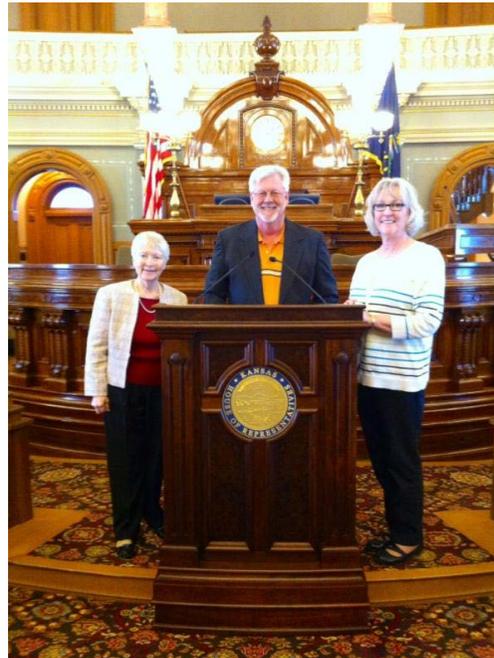

Legislature on break

The House and the Senate adjourned on Tuesday for a five-day recess after meeting Turnaround Day. Turnaround day is the last day to consider bills in house of origin, except by House and Senate Federal and State Affairs, Senate Ways and Means, Senate Assessment and Taxation, House committees on Calendar and Printing, Appropriations, Taxation or select committees of either house when so authorized and the blessing of dozens of bills they didn't get to this week. House bill 2595 passed out of the House Commerce, Labor and Economic Development Committee and is on the calendar for consideration by the full House.

The legislature will reconvene on March 2.
