## KMOM 2016 serves 1,231 people

On January 29-30, the [Kansas Dental Charitable Foundation](#) hosted the 15th Kansas Mission of Mercy in Topeka. During the two-day event, 1,231 people received dental care valued at \$1.2 million. The free dental clinic is open to anyone, and people are served on a first-come, first-serve basis. The first person was in line for services on Wednesday morning, in advance of the clinic opening early Friday. Nearly 1,000 volunteers were on hand to provide dental services, serve breakfast and lunch to patients and volunteers, and escort patients throughout the clinic. 

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## Concerned Kansans speak about Medicaid expansion

The Medicaid expansion plan, the Bridge to a Healthy Kansas, was to be introduced this week in the House. The official version of the bill has not been submitted due to an unforeseen circumstance. Revisor Norm Furse, had slipped on ice and has several injuries, therefore he was not able to finish the bill. Luckily, they have the assistant revisor currently working on it and hope to move the process further.

This week, the Kansas community has spoken up about the need for expansion. Former Insurance Commissioner, Sandy Praeger, wrote a letter to the editor in the Lawrence Journal World, reminding everyone that in 1998, the idea of expanding the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) was also a debate. But instead of denying the opportunity, they visited and set goals that would work for all. As should be done with Medicaid expansion.

First Care Clinic's Chief Executive Officer, Bryan Brady explains in his letter to the editor in the Hays Daily News, in

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their clinic they provide primary care services for the uninsured. But what happens when someone uninsured needs to go to the hospital or needs surgery? If you are working but uninsured, you still cannot pay the bill.

Father Bob Schremmer, Diocese of Dodge City, wrote in The Hutchinson News, not to be indifferent. We should not leave others out in the cold and uninsured.
