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Water Fluoridation Hearing in Wichita

Today the Wichita County Commission held a hearing on water fluoridation, following a decision they made last week to remove a fluoride education page from the Sedgwick County Health Department's website. Former CDC Division of Oral Health director and Assistant Surgeon General, Dr. Bill Maas was in Wichita and provided comments about the safety and effectiveness of water fluoridation. Halloween, Candy and Cavities

Many parents worry about their kids being on a sugar high when they come home with a ton of candy from trick or treating. But they need to also think about what all that

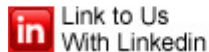
candy can do to their kid's teeth. There are several types of candies that kids get while trick or treating that taste great, but they can damage teeth.

Here is something you should know about candy:

- **Sour candy** can be acidic and wear down the enamel that protects teeth.
- **Sticky candy** such Skittles, Starburst and caramels is the worst for teeth, as they are likely to stay on teeth longer and could cause decay.
- **Hard candy** that you hold and suck on in your mouth are especially bad since they stay in your mouth for longer and give the enamel additional exposure to acids and sugars. In addition, chewing on or breaking hard candies can cause damage to tooth enamel.

Parents can let their children have all these yummy candies, but they need to keep in mind that it is best to allow your children to eat it in moderation and when they do eat them, they need to either brush or rinse their mouths with water afterwards. Drinking milk or eating a piece of cheese after eating the candy will help as well.
